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# A View from Calvary

### **Full-time Pastor**

but only Part-time Follower of Jesus



Although this was the title of an article directed to pastors printed in *Leadership Journal*, I thought this is an important topic to bring forth. As a pastor doing pastoral service as a job, I can fall in the

trap of becoming a part-time follower of Jesus. Looking good from the outside, doing all the pastoral duties I have been assigned, I am vulnerable to become empty inside. How long one can continue to be a pastor, an elder, or a leader without being really fed?

Lately we finished our walk through Peter's 1<sup>st</sup> Letter. In the 5<sup>th</sup> chapter, Peter encouraged the elders to be shepherds of the flock.

"To the elders among you, I appeal as a fellow elder... be shepherds of God's flock that is under your care, serving as overseers - not because you must, but because you are willing, as God wants you to be"(1,2). One of the most important tasks of a shepherd is to feed his flock. As elders, as Sunday school teachers, as leaders in the church, we need to feed our flock with the Word of God. But we

cannot do this unless we are fed ourselves. Three times Jesus asked Peter, "Do you love me?" After hearing his positive response, Jesus commanded, "Feed my sheep."



# Food Festival

With these words of encouragement from our Lord, the 2009 Food Festival committee held its first meeting on June 3, 2009 at Armine Adrouny's house, to plan for the upcoming Festival, which was to be held on Saturday, November 14 and Sunday, November 15.

The purpose of the 28th Annual Food Festival was twofold: spiritual outreach and to provide financial

support to the church.



The church's biggest fund raising event required intensive planning and an exceptional effort on the part of the dedicated volunteers who used their God-given talents and worked tirelessly in the following areas: food line, country cupboard, beverages, boutique Noel, Hyebucks, Christian outreach, musical entertainment, raffle, decorations, children's entertainment, finance and accounting, publicity, and volunteer coordination.

The Food Festival Committee hosted two luncheons to raise funds for the legs of lamb and other expenses of the Festival. The first luncheon was on Renewal Sunday, September 14 and the second on October 5 when we served more than 200 people who came to support the church and at the same time listen to Mrs. Rakel Dink from Istanbul. Additionally, two bake sales were held for the purpose of raising seed money.

The preparation for the authentic Armenian food and delicacies began in July and by early November our freezers were jam-packed with trays of sou boreg, different varieties of kuftas, spinach, Swiss chard and cheese boregs, manti, choregs, lahmajoon, pepper and tahini bread. The week of the Festival was the time to roll the famous yalanchi, the 1200 plus skewers of shish, chicken, and lulu kebobs and to put the finishing touches on the scrumptious desserts and pastries.



In addition to preparing the delicious foods, the ladies were also busy knitting, sewing, and shopping for the elegant boutique Noel.

For the first time this year we hosted the festival for two days, Saturday 12:00-9:00 pm and Sunday 12:00-3:00 pm. We were blessed with wonderful weather and a very good turnout from the Bay Area community. Many were from our immediate neighborhood and first time visitors.

For the second year in a row, the Food Festival Committee took this opportunity to provide Christian outreach to the community. The interest of visitors in Christian literature was higher than previous years.

Our valued guests were greeted in the foyer by the deacons, served hot beverages by the energetic youth at Hyebucks, as they were admiring the valuable raffle prizes, and were offered free Bibles and Christian CDs as they were browsing the various Christian books in the Christian Corner.

The delectable aromas of shish kebob and of the food on the serving line enticed our guests to the elegantly decorated Halajian hall. The country cupboard was bursting with homemade desserts, jams and pastries.

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The well-designed boutique Noel offered hundreds of items including handmade crafts, jewelry, oriental rugs, Christmas decorations, and children's toys, to name a few.



Once again, our valued guests were entertained by live Christian and Armenian music provided by the talented Calvary Jazz ensemble and Badveli Balabanian. We would also like to thank the Yerevan and Ani dance groups who gracefully performed Armenian folk dances on both days of the festival

The CACC Food festival is undoubtedly an event which brings our dedicated church members together. Although the days were sometimes

Jesus is in the saving and healing business at Grace

Healing Home. Men come in addicted to drugs and alcohol, sick, and

broken by past experiences - As they learn to know Jesus and His Word, He changes lives and puts men back on their feet. This introduction to the Lord lasts at least a month and as long as an individual needs it to. As men get ready to step back into society, a discipleship program is also at Grace Healing Home. A low monthly fee for those receiving income makes it possible for the men to continue living in San Francisco without paying this city's stratospheric rents. Most work, some go to school, and some are disabled or retired. More than housing, education or employment, the goal is a life of following and serving Jesus.

Once again, the AMAA is sponsoring an internship during the summer of 2010. This twoweek work-mission experience is planned for young men and women over the age of eighteen who are interested and motivated to learn about the AMAA's work in the Middle East and to serve there

This year's mission will focus on the KCHAG Armenian Evangelical campground about fifteen minutes outside Beirut, Lebanon. In addition to learning about the programs of the AMAA, the team will be doing light to heavy work (depending on personal skills) to renovate one or more buildings. Some sight-seeing is also scheduled, as well as interaction with local youth.

The trip will be from July 11 to 28 and the cost to each participant will be airfare (approx. \$1500-\$1800) and personal spending money; the AMAA will provide housing and meals and help with organizing air transportation. Deadline for applications is April 15, but it is best to apply as soon as possible in order to secure airline reservations which are in short supply. Contact the office or AMAA for an application.

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
